Victorys from around Alberta gather for Meet in the Middle


"This is the most Victorys I have ever seen in one place."

That comment was heard not once. not twice, but three times during August 21's Meet in the Middle. This year's event proved to be more of a ride challenge. In the past two events, riders from all over the province met in Red Deer for a short ride to a local watering hole for lunch. Several participants asked for a longer ride this year and several Edmonton area riders asked for Drumheller to be the destination. The MITM organizing committee (Jamie Wiltzen, Charles Lott, Dean Simpson, Big Don, DrifterDon and Darren W.) obliged by putting together a meet up in Stettler and a 130 km ride to Drumheller which took in a side trip on the Bleriot

Meeting in Stettler meant being on the road very early for the Calgary and Edmonton riders (200 and 180 kms respectively, just to the start of the ride.)

From Stettler the riders dropped straight down Highway 56 and then detoured on Highway 27 to find the secondary road to the Bleriot Ferry. Bleriot is a cable ferry across the Red Deer River. The routes down to the ferry and up out of the river valley are spectacular examples of Drumheller's legendary badlands. Also legendary is Drumheller's heat. The temperature began to climb as the group passed the Royal Tyrell Dinosaur Museum and the other visitor attractions in Drum. Despite DrifterDon leading the parade of more than 25 motorcycles, the group managed to get to their destination - Hoodoo Voodoo Cycle & Motorsports, run by well-known Victory mechanic Jeremy MacKenzie.

The annual Ride to Reynolds is a popular one, not just for our club, but for many Victory riders.

More than a dozen VRC members rolled out of Calgary for the ride to Wetaskiwin on August 20. When they arrived, they found numerous other Victorys from the Edmonton area. One count had almost 30 Vics at the event among the 600 or so bikes that attended. The event seemed less well attended this year which organizers said was the result of the heat and other events going

on in the biking community. The grounds were re-organized this year, putting the band and the food service and beer garden over with the vendors. Inside was an extensive display of rare and interesting motorcycles The museum was founded by a Wetaskiwin car dealer who said he would take anything in trade except wives and kids. What he took in trade became the basis for the farm machinery-car-truckmotorcycle-aircraft museum. It is also home to the Canada Aviation Hall of Fame.

A dispute between the town of Longview and the Twin Cities Saloon meant part of Bury the Hatchet got buried.

The annual ride and axe-throwing competition between us and IMRG 1908 (Indian Riders) became just a ride as a result of the dispute. Rather than cancel the entire event, the two club executives decided to carry on the ride part and postpone the axe throwing.

The ride went ahead August 13. Riders from the two clubs gathered at CycleWorks Calgary and rode in separate groups out Crowchild Trail to Highway 1A, past Cochrane and Morley. They then hooked back at Bow Valley Provincial Park onto Highway 1 and down Highway 40 into Kananaskis Country.

The groups came together at a gas/ rest/photo-op stop at Fortress Junction.

From there they left as one group and crossed over the Highwood Pass, then out Highway 541 to Longview where Twin Cities owner Chris greeted the groups and settled them in for lunch.

The competition part of Bury the Hatchet is still to be decided. It may be at Longview if the situation is resolved, or it may take another form in Calgary. Meanwhile the trophy stays with Victory Riders Calgary.

Roles & Duties...

Being a Road Captain - Skills

As with any riding club, Road Captains are always in shortage. We thought that by explaining the Road Captain role and duties might take a somewhat mysterious role within the club, and explain it in a way to allow for others to consider taking up such a role. As we all know, clubs can never have enough Road Captains. The plan is to have a series of articles to help explain the Road Captain role.

Road Captains (RC) are typically the quintessential individual when planning and executing road trips, whether they be day trips or lengthier multi-day rides. So what are some of those inspiring skills sets an RC must have?

- 1. Riding Skills that's right, you must have motorcycle riding experience (kinda like those rides where you must be THIS TALL to get on the ride). How much experience is always up for discussion (like what is the best oil to use) but a number of years with exposure or experience in riding different settings (terrain, weather, conditions, groups) is mandatory. If I was pressured to pick a number five years comes to mind however it usually dependent on experience.
- 2. Leadership Skills if you are going to be an RC you need leadership skills in order to not drive yourself insane. There is no room for a "Charlie Brown" personality (flopping back and forth on a decision) in this role. An RC is ultimately responsible for those riders on their ride, and they must be able to make quick and decisive decisions. Its not that RCs can't take advice or consider options, but they are accountable to make the/that decision.
- 3. Communications Skills for the RC, it's all about communications



when executing road trips. If an RC cannot clearly communicate expectations, commands, directions, etc. you will be setting yourself up for failure. Communication skills can be learned but it takes time – if you cannot talk yourself out of trouble you'll be in trouble (this coming from the guy who set the record for most jails visited during a United Nations tour).

As you can see, even before being considered for a Road Captain role, there are certain skills an individual must have to assist in the success as an RC. If you have the above skills sets, you're well on your way.
