Writing-on-Stone campout finally happened

It took two tries, but the Club finally pulled off the camping overnighter at Writing-on-Stone Provincial Park.

The first planned trip was rained out, but four determined campers - Prez John B, Drifter, Jamie McG and newcomer **Trevor** - braved the elements for what turned out to be a great outing July 19 and 20.

Writing-on-Stone is a **UNESCO** World Heritage site located east of Milk River iust north of the Montana border. The campground at the park was full, so our intrepid adventurers landed in the laidback private campground in Milk River.

The ride started at Aldersyde Petro-Can and John B chose an interesting route down Highway 2 to Fort Macleod

In the morning, the group broke camp, hit breakfast at the Sandstone again; and, under non-raining skies, headed east 42 kilometres to Writingon-Stone.

The park hosts a world-class interpretive centre, telling the fascinating story of the area, both historically and geologically.

The river valley with its unique sandstone formations has been inhabited and a trade zone for **9,000 years**. It contains the greatest concentration of rock art on the North American Great Plains. There are over 50 petroglyph sites and thousands of individual drawings. The park was a North-West Mounted Police outpost from 1887 to 1918. There is also a huge number of rattlesnakes which not everyone in the group knew before camping.

The group decided to head for **Twin** Butte General Store for a late lunch, arriving there about 3 pm. Food was great as always.

While gassing up in Pincher Creek, the group saw dark clouds socking in the north, so rain gear was the order of the day. It came into use as the rain, feeling more like hail, hit on Highway 22 and continued all the way home. But really, who cares if you get wet on the ride home?


Red Rock Coulee - long ride for a unique site

I have a few friends who had visited Red Rock Coulee Natural Area. Based on their descriptions, I had to see it for myself.

My **expectation** of the area was a vast open coulee with giant red rocks scattered like round bales in a hay field, but this **wasn't exactly the case.**

Our route was a lot of major



highways through the southern Alberta prairies, approximately **625 kilometres of much the same view.** The Trans-Canada highway between **Calgary** and **Medicine Hat** is not the most exciting stretch of road, but it was the quickest way to **HWY 3** and **Seven Persons**, Alberta.

(Side note: Seven Persons is home to **Premium Sausage**, some of the best homemade sausage; reminds me of my dad's.)

Red Rock Coulee is 26 kilometres south of Seven Persons on **Highway 887** with roughly one kilometre of gravel to the parking area. In 1985, **Alberta Parks** designated the 801 acre parcel a natural area. It has **no facilities** other than a picnic table.



Red sandstone boulders up to 2.5 meters in diameter are scattered throughout the area, creating an other-worldly scene. The sandstone rocks - 'concretions' in geological terms - have eroded out of the bedrock and are thought to be among the largest in the world.

The red rocks are a very **short walk** from the gate and cover a relatively small area of the 800 acres. Looking down from the top of the coulee at the treeless landscape, the **'fish out of water'** reddish-orange rocks appear to have been placed in their locations.

On the return route we traveled west on Hwy 3 to **Taber, AB** for lunch and rehydration in the 30° weather and a good time to remind future visitors to bring lots of **water and sunscreen.**

After lunch we headed northwest on a slightly **more scenic** route on secondary highways to **Lomond**, **AB** and on to **Vulcan**, **AB**. After a quick fuel stop we continued north on **HWY 24** towards home.





Facilities and interpretation are minimal at the 801 acre site.



And, of course, it was tagged.
